Dear Parents

Year 5, 1066 and all that.

On a glorious, sunny Friday before half term, Year 5 took Mrs. Hayward and Mr Cattnach to the site of the battle where England lost 0-1 to France.

On arrival at the ancient Abbey in Battle we all watched a video on the events leading up to the battle and what happened on 14th October 1066. Then the children all tried their hand (or arms) at lifting the swords and shields used by the Saxons and Normans, and felt the weight of the chainmail worn by the Norman horsemen.

We walked around the Abbey grounds and viewed Senlac Field where thousands lost their lives on that fateful day. Mr C. told us how William the Conqueror built the Abbey where King Harold fell and lost his life.

After lunch in the Abbey grounds and a frantic spending spree in the shop we carried on to Hastings (via Mrs. Hayward's old school) and the Norman castle, one of the first to be built by William in 1067. Now a ruin, caused by storms, cliff erosion and Victorian archaeologists, it does have splendid views of the old town, the fishing boats, Hastings Pier and the house where Mrs. Hayward lived as a child.

Here the children watched yet another telling of the 1066 story before spending some time exploring and drawing some of the ruined walls and arches. The day was finished off with ice creams while Mr C. and Mrs H. recovered with a well deserved cup of tea and apple pie.

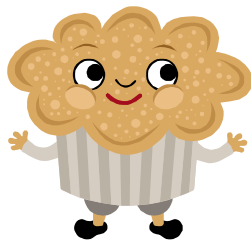

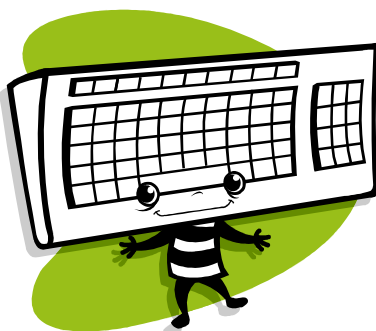
The course is appropriate for pupils age 10 and over. Siblings are welcome too.

Moon Hall College crush Canbury.

On Thursday, June 4th, Moon Hall College recorded a resounding victory against Canbury School, Kingston by seven wickets. The chief architect of victory was Jake McMonagle who opened the attack and secured four scalps at a cost of just twelve runs, three of his victims being clean bowled -the result of fast, straight bowling.

Having won the toss, Canbury decided to bat on a green, seamer-friendly wicket. Under an over-cast sky, they soon lost three wickets all at the score of 9, courtesy of McMonagle. Only the opposition's most skilful batsman, Hamichi, looked secure and he eventually succumbed to a cleverly disguised slower ball from Nick Bowkett who later claimed three more wickets to finish with the startling figures of 3.1 2 10 4.

The fiery bowling attack, led by William Pereira and McMonagle, was supported by sharp fielding epitomised by a good catch at slip by Sophie Heron. The skipper, Freddie Leveson, showed both skill and great courage to keep to Pereira's searing pace and had collected a few bruises by the end of Canbury's innings which yielded only 57 runs.

Leveson and McMonagle then opened the batting, the latter playing some aggressive strokes. McMonagle had scored 10 before he was forced to retire due to academic commitments. Leveson was then joined by Pereira but was soon spectacularly run out in a dire misunderstanding with his partner, the ferocity of the fieldsman's throw uprooting one of the stumps!

Pereira, determined to finish the game quickly, struck two fours in the same over and then followed this with a perfect square cut for another boundary, his right foot having moved beautifully back and across the crease! Two more wickets fell but Moon Hall secured a convincing win due to the uncomplicated methods of Harry Davies and the concentration of James Fitzgibbons, both of whom hit a boundary.
