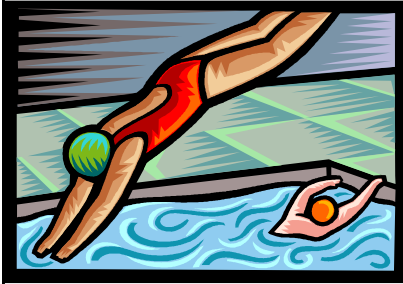

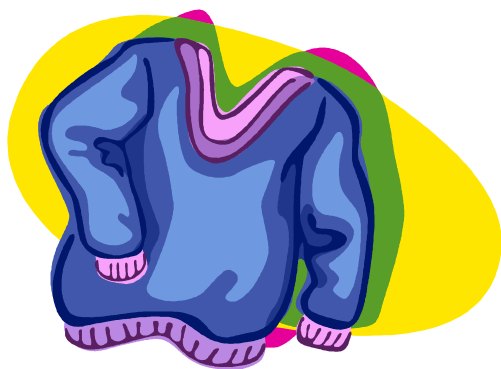
Sports Kit

Skipper Loft Blasts Four As No Prisoners Are Taken!

Three games without a win was simply too much for Oscar Loft to stomach and he took out his frustrations on a hapless Reigate St.Mary's team at the Hartswood on Wednesday as he led Burys Court to a thoroughly convincing 5-0 drubbing of our rivals.

The game really was a mismatch, the ball hardly ever appearing in our own half; indeed, goal keeper Liam Patel was only in action once -much to his chagrin but to the delight of every other Burys Court player and supporter!

The team was trying out a new more defensive formation of 3/1/2 to help stem the number of goals that have recently been scored against us so it was never going to be a goal feast. The new "shape" was not expected to be necessary against RSM but was utilised to help provide practice and food for thought in our build up to the massive contest against our formidable opponent on March 16th when Burys Court face the intimidating might of the much vaunted Felton Fleet School in Cobham.

However, Burys Court was rather slow out of the blocks. There was much passing and two decisive hits were cracked straight at the RSM goalkeeper but no goals had been registered in the first twelve minutes. George Mustchin, in his new position as right mid-field, had had enough and he streamed through the opposition left defence and smashed the ball into the back board. The look on his face said it all; it was neither a triumphant expression nor an angry one but his features and body language made his feelings obvious: "That's how to do it, lads! Now stop all this pretty passing and let's get on with the main business -scoring goals!"

Loft needed no second invitation. He scored almost immediately but a 2-0 score-line at half-time hardly reflected the enormous chasm between the two teams.

The second half was so much better. Loft passed back to his centre back Joe McLaughlin who on several occasions passed to the left back Marcus Malley and right back Corbyn Johannes, the latter two feeding the ball to the left mid-field and right mid-field respectively -exactly the set piece that James Tindall had put the boys through before Half-Term. Perhaps the most pleasing aspect of the whole match was the way that the backs came up to assist in attacks with the right and left mid-fielders. Tarran Lineham, who had a superb second half, "one-twoed" with Malley at least four times. Nick Gill came on as right back and he and Mustchin ran rings around the RSM left back with some wonderful passing. Corbyn Johannes also called for the ball at several critical moments when he was a back and Lineham again showed great presence of mind and used him most effectively by passing back to him.

Loft scored three goals in this half. Mustchin must have run down the right wing five or six times and really should have scored two or three more goals. Nevertheless, the way that Mustchin and Loft work together can only augur so, so well for their respective clubs, Oxted and East Grinstead. Indeed, the ubiquitous Mustchin has just been head hunted by East Grinstead -the Man U of hockey and top club in Britain. Their men win all the major trophies and the East Grinstead coach has described Mustchin as "exceptional". I am not the slightest bit surprised. These two most talented young men have already surpassed the skills of their coach. They scare him -but most of all they excite him!

We have a break next week -Phew! I could do with it!- but all eyes will be to the north-west for our giant killing match at Cobham. We will need to be in fifth gear from the word go. However, if Crawley FC can scare Man United and Ireland defeat the might of Strauss' men in Bangalore, then Burys Court can fight to the last and conquer our Goliath. We may not have 9,000 supporters watching as Crawley did (although I know that our loyal band of followers are really appreciated by the team) nor have the luck of the Irish in the World Cup but Burys Court has one quality in abundance -pure, unadulterated determination. We'll need it...but -what the heck!- let's go for it!
